High School Profile



THE COMMUNITY

Middleburgh High School services a rural community with a population of approximately 5,400 people, which includes Middleburgh, Preston Hollow, Fultonham, Huntersland, Livingstonville, West Fulton, and Breakabeen. It is the only high school serving Middleburgh Central School District. The district is located in the mid-eastern portion of Schoharie County.

OUR SCHOOL DISTRICT

Middleburgh High School is a public school that is comprised of grades 9-12, with approximately 200 students enrolled. The school is accredited by the New York State Department of Education and the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

Middleburgh Central School District (MCSD) has been named a Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) district by the New York State Department of Education. To qualify for CEP, over 60% of MSCD households meet the low-income threshold.

DISTINCTION

Middleburgh Central School District was named a 2025 Honoree in the School/School District category for the "What's Great in Our State" awards, presented by the New York State Office of Mental Health. This award recognizes innovative approaches that strengthen mental health wellness.

MCSD has been honored with the prestigious New York State Public High School Athletic Association Inc. (NYSPHSAA) School of Excellence Award for the 2024-25 school year. This recognition is awarded to schools where at least 75% of varsity teams qualify for the Scholar Athlete Team Award. MCSD surpassed this benchmark.



MINDFUL EDUCATION

Throughout the year, Middleburgh Central School District integrates mental health support instruction into its academic and extracurricular opportunities through partnerships with the Sweethearts and Heroes program and the Partnerships in Education and Resiliency Institute. This is in addition to multiple offerings available to students through the district's counseling department.



Curriculum

Grading: Final grades are calculated by averaging grades for all quarters and the final examinations. The highest grade given is 100, and the minimum passing grade is 65. Cumulative averages are not weighted.

GPA/Class Rank: Class rank is weighted. It is calculated as follows:

1. Advanced Placement and University in the High School courses receive a weight multiplier of 1.05.
2. Regents and honors, and courses that require a prerequisite are assigned a weight multiplier of 1.03.
3. Local-level courses, which may be less rigorous and may be college preparatory, carry a standard weight of 1.00.

More than one student may have the same rank in class. Final rank is calculated after the 7th semester.



Advanced Diplomas

For an Advanced Regents Diploma, students are required to have at least 22 credits, including 4 English, 4 social studies, 3 math (Algebra 1, Geometry, and Algebra 2), 3 science (including 2 Regents Exams), 1 fine art, a half credit in health, 2 physical education, 3 foreign language (or a 5-unit sequence in fine arts or career and technical education to supplant foreign language), and 1.5 elective credits, as well as passing a minimum of 8 required state Regents Exams.

For a Regents Diploma, students are required to have at least 22 credits, including 4 English, 4 social studies, 3 math, 3 science, 1 fine art, a half credit in health, 2 physical education, 1 foreign language and 3.5 elective credits, as well as passing a minimum of 5 required state Regents Exams.

Due to the school's small size and the breadth of programs offered, scheduling constraints may occasionally require students to enroll in a course that is less rigorous than the level for which they are eligible. Program levels are:

1. Advanced Placement (6 courses) and University in the High School (5 courses)
2. Regents and 1 honors course; college preparatory level
3. Local Level; less rigorous, may be college preparatory

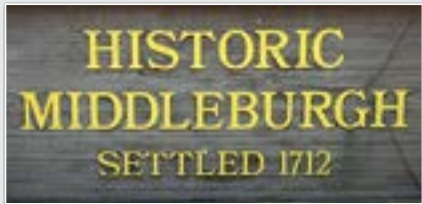
